



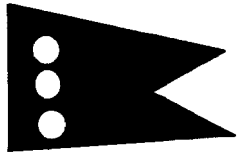

After the checkout I remember Al saying to me "Dave, that boat is a dream, what a dream, take care of her".

A few days later I brought the Hunter in hot. Al was there to help slow the boat down as she entered the slip.

Al shook his head and warned me not to do that again. I was so embarrassed! To betray Al on 'his' boat!

Al went on to buy Freedom Too. He had the boat painted and faired, he replaced all of the rigging, smoothed the hull, bought new sails and new upholstery.

When the date arrived Rob Matheny and I met Al at the boat. Al took us through the boat and showed us every nook and cranny. He showed us how to flush the engine with fresh water. He told us which sails to use in which conditions. He introduced us to many terrific cleaning products. And much more.

I remember Al saying "Goodbye sweetheart" and brushed aside a tear as he began to walk up the dock gangway. At the curb Al said 'Dave she's a dream, take good care of her'.

## **MIDWINTER REGATTA**

The Midwinter Regatta is the weekend of February 19 and 20. Seventy local one design and cruiser races are held from Santa Barbara to San Diego and out to Phoenix. This is the Southern California Yachting Association's (SCYA) largest fund-raiser of the year. The Midwinters actually attract more boats and participants than any other race in the region; eclipsing even the Newport-Ensenada Race in numbers if not stature!

On Sunday the Solings will race. We need skippers and crew to field our two Solings in the race.

Also on Sunday, the top Hobie Wave racers and the top trimaran racers will compete in a face-off on the Hobie Waves. The course will start inside, go outside and finish inside. The winner will be crowned the Marina del Rey Multihull Biathlete Champ.

### TRAINING

Members can quickly and easily see the line up of available boats and available times so that planning a sailing trip is a Breeze! At the end of each week our stalwart staff makes the final adjustments and entries, and staff volunteer, Peter Griswold, takes the next week's reservation sheets, hot off the printer, down to the dock boxes, and like the turn of the glass on the quarterdeck, makes the next weeks schedule a reality to look forward to!

Online reservations can be made from the [fairwind.org](http://www.fairwind.org) website. Those members not online can make phone reservations at (310) 288-2555. Reservations are on a first come, first serve basis; regardless of how submitted (by phone or in real time online). Phone reservations will be updated only once a day. Phone reservations, as well as online reservations are "time-stamped," and it can be easily determined who reserved a boat first.

**Fairwind Yacht Club is offering the first ASA Examination of 2005:**

**Basic Keelboat (ASA 101):**

Prerequisites: None

General Description: Able to sail a boat of about 20 feet in length in light to moderate winds and sea conditions in familiar waters without supervision. A preparatory Standard with no auxiliary power or navigation skills required.

(This includes a practical test, as well as a written one)

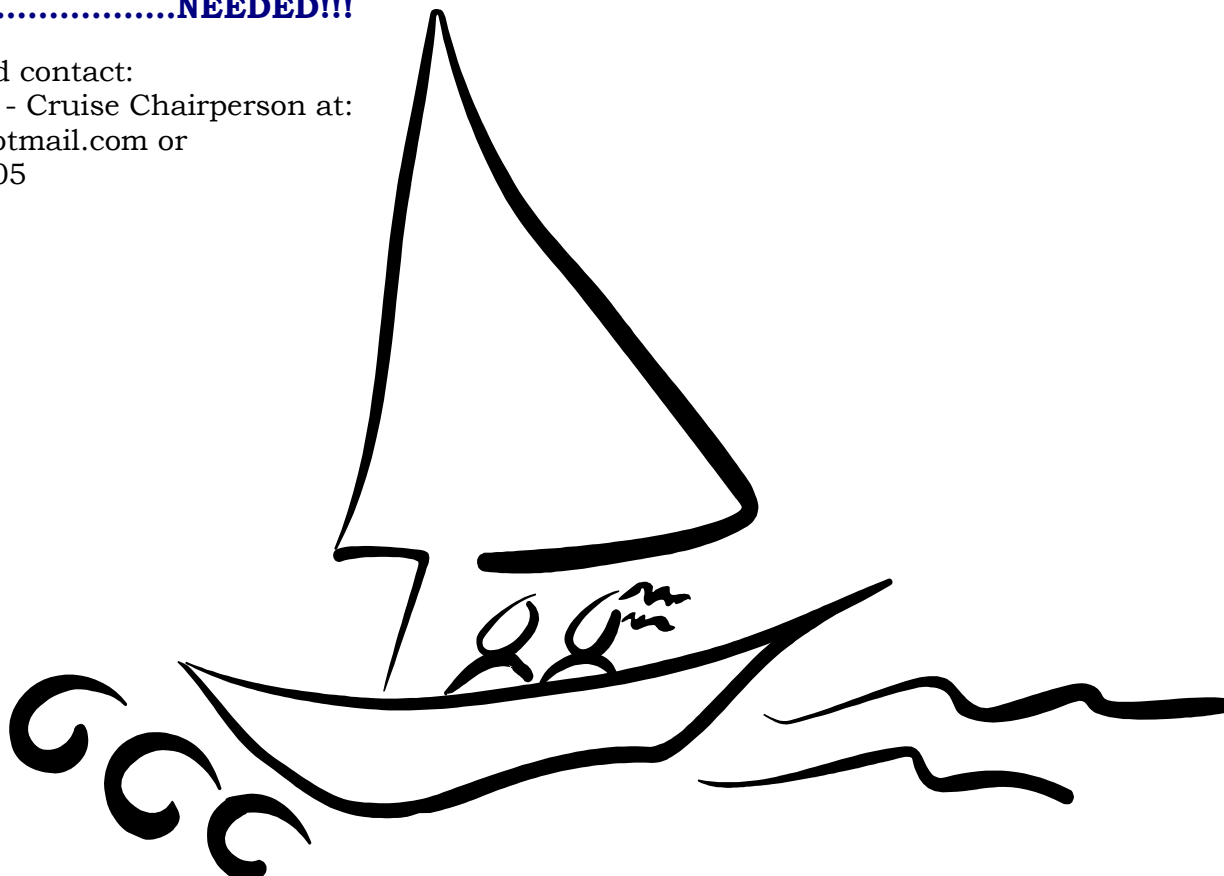

4. Find the boat you want to reserve, and click on the "plus" sign, next to the start time. 5. Scroll down to the "username/ password" area.
5. Your **username** will be the first 4 letters of your "**last name**", a dot "." plus the "**first initial**" of your first name, i.e. "**bonn.s**" The password will be "**fyc.411**". (If you would like your own unique password, please fill out the form on the "user list" page. You will be notified when the new password is functional). Phone reservations will not be available for members with unique passwords.
6. After logging in, you will need to enter a brief description for the reservation (for example: day sail, training, cruise, etc) and the duration of the reservation, as well as other information that might be required. *All day reservations start at midnight, so it is preferable to calculate the total hours, even on multi day trips, rather than clicking the "all day" box, to avoid overlaps.*
7. Save your entries and the system will update automatically, reflecting your just entered reservation.
8. Double-check the correctness of your reservation and log off from the system. Reservations can be edited and/or deleted by clicking on the reservation you want to change/delete, and follow the above steps.

## TO MAKE A RESERVATION BY PHONE:

1. Call (310) 288-2555
2. Leave your username, and your full name and phone number, and the boat and time you want to reserve.

Here are a few things to remember when making reservation:

1. You can only make one "day sail" reservation online at any time.
2. You can only make one overnight reservation per quarter. (This can be in addition to your "day sail" reservation.
3. The cut off time for making online (or phone) reservations is 6pm Friday for the following

week. Reservation sheets will be delivered to the dock boxes Friday night, or early Sat. reflecting all reservations entered before the deadline.

4. Reservations during the current week (Sat-Fri) need to be handwritten at the dock in order to be guaranteed! Please also enter them online; as this will help other members plan their "short term" reservations. To make cancellations during the current week: in addition to deleting the online reservation, the reservation sheets at the dock also need to be updated, reflecting the cancellation. If you are unable to make it, leave your cancellation request on our reservation voice mail.
5. Reservations by instructors for training purposes, will not count toward their personal reservation (Please enter "Training" in the description).
6. There is a "user list" link available on the top right hand corner of the reservation page. Members can complete their info, as well as change their password.

## IO AND YOU

In June the IO, a Catalina 27 Tall Rig berthed near our boats was donated to FYC. The boat had belonged to William Shipley, who had worked at JPL on the Jupiter project, (hence the name; IO is a moon of Jupiter). William Shipley had been ill for several years, the boat was not in the best of shape, but his son Stan also included a \$2,500 contribution from his father's estate to cover some of the cost of repairs.

Chas Belknap had been looking for a boat that he could use for a month on a solo "retreat." He agreed to take the boat to San Pedro and rent a slip at his own expense for several months. The agreement read that Chas could, with approval from the Boat Chief, spend the \$2,500. Any additional costs he would cover until the club decided to accept the boat into its active fleet.

After getting the bottom paint redone in MDR, Chas took the boat to Cabrillo Way Marina in San Pedro where he worked on the boat in preparation for his trip.



Over the next several weeks Chas cleaned out the boat, replaced all wiring, relocated and replaced the switch panel, and relocated the "Perko." Colonial Marina un-stepped the mast so the Chas could paint, rewire, replace standing and running rigging, add an antenna to the masthead, and hang a steaming/deckflood light. The mast was re-stepped and a new main installed in the week before Chas left for his trip.

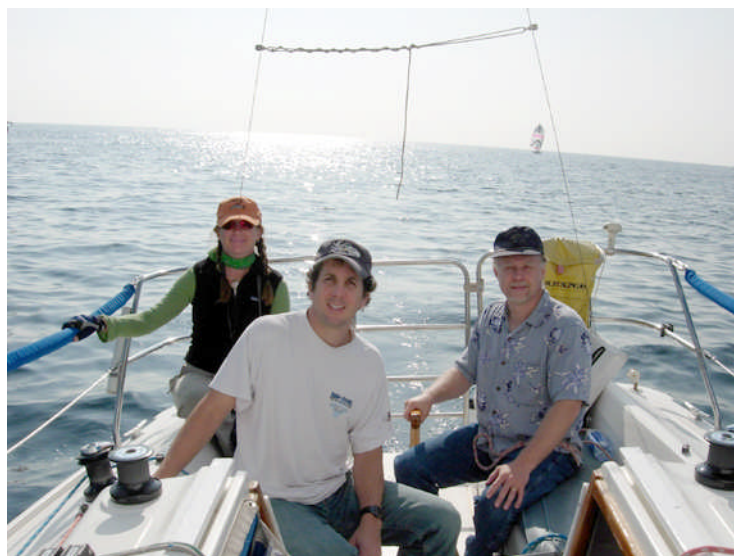
A change in plans limited Chas's cruise to two weeks but he was able to cruise the shores of Santa Barbara, San. Nicolas, Anacapa, Santa Cruz, and Santa Catalina. The trip turned out to be more of a shakedown cruise than a retreat as equipment was tested, replaced and repaired. In December Dick Gross, Dave Lumian, and Peter Gonzales came to San Pedro to check out the work Chas had done and to take a short sail. The boat, while still needing some cosmetic work, is ready to be used by the club. It will remain in San Pedro where we hope the boat will be the seed for a new branch of the Club. Members can contact Chas for a checkout. (Please use his e-mail [housing@mhala.org](mailto:housing@mhala.org)). Chas has agreed to remain boat chief but is looking to an assistant boat chief to help out.

IO is similar in almost all respects to Fairwind I. The major differences are the permanent preventers rigged to the boom, but they require no special training. The outboard is pull start, and the stove is an alcohol stove. There is no GPS on the boat as yet.

While the boat does not require special training, San Pedro (AKA Hurricane Gulch) does require local knowledge. Conditions can be very windy. There are no handy separation schemes to keep the powerboats, commercial trawlers, tankers, porpoises, tugs pushing barges, container ships, articulated bridges, fishing skiffs, cruise ships, dredging operations, wave runners, bait barges, marine refuge areas, harbor tour boats, kayaks, wind surfers, party boats, coast guard craft, fire boats, sea lions, tall ships, and small sloops conveniently on separate courses. You will be sailing at the entrance of the busiest commercial harbor in the United States. Sobriety in these waters is never to be assumed.

Directions: Take Harbor Blvd south until it turns into Miner Street. Continue straight, crossing 22<sup>nd</sup> Street. Cabrillo Way Marina will be the first marina on the right. Park in any open space on right of left. Gangway gate is usually open but you can wait for someone to let you in if you find it closed. Proceed down gangway, walk about 30 feet, turn right, IO is at slip 121.
