



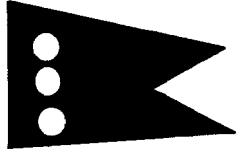

SAILING—THE AIR FORCE WAY

My friend, Capt. John Wintrobe, told me this true story last month, and it is one of the funniest I've heard about teaching sailing.

John was an Air Force pilot, and was based in Florida. The Strategic Air Command (SAC) Alert Facility was lovingly called the "Mole Hole" since it was underground. Nice place to spend about 1/2 your life. It was located at Homestead AF, 25 mi south of Miami and 1 mi from Biscayne Bay. An avid sailor, John approached the base recreation officer, trying to get him to put together a sailing program. They were polite, but non-committal. John, not to be deterred, was able to get a boat broker to loan him a 14' O'Day Javelin, a little centerboard daysailer, and he sailed it a LONG way along the ocean to get near the base.

"There was no place on the base to sail, so I set the boat up on the grass between the Mole Hole and the ramp where the 8 B-52s were parked on alert. We even had land crabs and sea gull poop to add reality to the scene." What he found was that the boat spun around, fully rigged, on the Bermuda grass and was a great training aid! So he had a group of guys out on the grass, and with the wind blowing, John would turn the boat to simulate the movement of the boat relative to the wind! He'd heel the boat; hit it with wakes, waves, and gusts of wind. The guys, often lubricated, would be whooping, hollering, and having a great time! A UNIQUE way to learn tiller steering and points-of-sail! Unfortunately, it didn't work---they gave the \$\$ to the base golf course.

REMEMBER TO REPORT IT!

All skippers have a responsibility to report any damage to club boats, or any contact between a club boat and another boat or object (e.g. grounding). The intent of this rule is not to punish anyone; as a rule Fairwind skippers are very good about taking responsibility for their actions. It's important for the boat chiefs and the board to be informed about these things so that we can spot any trends or patterns that occur; that way we can address issues in a holistic way before the turn into problems.

For example, if we notice that a few members have lost winch handles overboard on the same boat, we'll probably look at adding a more secure handle holder. If several skippers report grounding on the north entrance to the marina, we'll call the authorities and have them move the warning buoys as well as start lobbying for another round of dredging.

Please report to the boat chief, fleet captain, rear commodore, and safety officer (as well as in the vessel's log) if there is any:

- Contact with another vessel
- Unexplained damage to the boat when you arrive
- Crew overboard incident
- Injury on board or on the dock
- Complaint from one of our neighbors
- Boarding or citation by law enforcement
- Equipment malfunction
- Missing or inoperable safety equipment
- Other risk or damage to life or property.

If in doubt, report it!

PROPOSED CHANGES TO THE BY-LAWS AND STANDING RULES

The board is proposing some changes to the By-Laws and Standing Rules. This was discussed at the General meeting on Wednesday, January 24. We will be voting to approve these changes will be at the General Membership meeting in May.

The purpose of these changes is to

- Include decisions already made by the membership
- Reflect new regulatory requirements (e.g. adding "California Department of Boating and Waterways" to list of authorities to be notified in the event of an accident)
- Eliminate outdated unused items (e.g. Telephone Prime Time reservations)
- Incorporate new realities (e.g. email notification of meetings)

We are not proposing changing anything other than the above at this time. There were a number of excellent suggestions for changes made at the January meeting that will be incorporated in future change proposals.

CHECK IT, DOUBLE CHECK IT, TRIPLE CHECK IT

One of the biggest threats to the inboard diesel engines on our medium and large boats is overheating. There are a number of things that can cause this, but the three most common are a clogged seawater intake strainer, a broken impeller, or simply forgetting to open the seawater intake through-hull valve. Fairwind's standard operating procedure for boats with inboard engines provides a triple check for overheating.

CHECK

First, visually check the seawater intake strainer, and clean if necessary. Then, make sure the through-hull valve is open. We leave the keys on the through-hull valve to make this easy to remember. Be sure that the valve is open, and you don't shut it by simply changing to the opposite position that you found it in. Don't forget to also check the coolant level.

DOUBLE CHECK

Next, double check by making sure water is flowing overboard from the exhaust after you start the engine. If you're unsure if there is water flowing, step off the boat (only if you're still at the dock!), and look from the side of the boat.

TRIPLE CHECK

Finally, triple check by checking the temperature gauge periodically while underway.

YAHOO! GROUPS

RESERVATION ETIQUETTE

When you write in a reservation at the docks, please consider also entering the reservation in the on-line system. Once the reservation sheets are printed Friday night, the printed sheets are the reservation of record, but it's a nice thing to also enter your reservation in the on-line system so others know that the boat has been reserved.

IMPORTANT PHONE NUMBERS

If you have an emergency on the water, your first choice for communication should be VHF channel 16. As a backup, in case the radio isn't working, you should have recorded the appropriate phone numbers for use with a cell phone. Did you know that 911 calls from cell phones go to the California Highway Patrol? Having the direct numbers can save precious minutes in the event of an emergency.

AN INSTRUCTING AFTERNOON

This last week, I had an interesting new experience: instructing and checking out two club ASA Certified Sailing instructors on our new boat, Island Side, the Catalina 28.

Rick Weinberger and John Quickly had asked me to help them out. Rick needed his first signature, and John his second. John had previously undergone training by the Boat Chief, Fred Taylor, and Rick had gone down to the boat the day before, and had "dry sailed" the boat with Rear Commodore Susan Bonner.

Their previous preparation was obvious. The two of them started "running the systems," and quickly ran through every function on the boat. In about an hour, we were ready to leave the dock. With no special instruction, I had both leave the dock, run out to the Basin, then dock. Both were smooth as silk.

We ran through a few maneuvers on the way out of the marina, and found perfect 10 knot winds and no swells outside the breakwater. We ran our COB drills, and it was interesting discussing these maneuvers and options between us. I was particularly impressed with Rick's ability to maneuver the boat, upon which he had never previously sailed. For John, his ease with the maneuvers showed his comfort with the boat.

These guys have a great understanding of this boat, and will contribute to our instructor pool for this boat greatly, as they have in the past on other boats.

SEATOW—THEY'RE THERE FOR US !!!!!!!

HOW TO CONTACT SEATOW:

- First and foremost, **USE Channel 16** on our VHF's.
- The national # is **(800) 4 Seatow**
- The local # is **(866) 473-5400**

WHO'S COVERED:

Every mid & large level vessel in the Fairwind Fleet, both MDR & Oxnard.

WHAT DO WE PAY:

The annual coverage is \$149 per vessel to the Club. There's an hourly towing charge of \$50 *payable by members* (It's waived within 5 miles of the MDR entrance) when the services are used.

WHAT'S OUR COVERAGE??

1. **Assistance Towing**
In the event of engine failure, the Seatow officer-on-duty will do all he can to "talk us through" the engine issue & get it started again. If necessary, Seatow will tow us in. If we've within 5 miles of the MDR breakwater entrance, Captain Nick will waive the \$50/hour charge. Otherwise, it's \$50/hour *payable by the member*.
2. **Jump start**
3. **Fuel Transfer** (There's a per gallon surcharge—expect about \$5.00/gal)
4. **Soft Bottom Grounding** (Always at the discretion of the Seatow Captain).

5. **Dock to dock tows** (As available in off-peak times-don't expect this on a busy summer afternoon).
6. As a courtesy, *they handle our float plans* for Fairwind cruisers.

Hard/rock groundings are considered salvage and insurance issues... they will provide helpful referrals.

In addition, Captain Nick will provide courtesy help inside the Marina for our non-powered daysailors as available.

The local team are great people and they appreciate Fairwind.

OLD MARINER'S LORE

PIPING THE SIDE The proper name of the shrill metal whistle, used by the navy is the boatswain's call, and sounding it is known as piping. The term "Piping the Side" originated in the days of sailing ships, from the way visiting captains arrived on board. Instead of climbing the ladders, they were hoisted aboard by a group of sailors called the Side Party, a title shortened in time to "the side." The order to "pipe the side" was given by the officer of the watch, and the boatswain relayed this to the men using his call. This salute to a visiting dignitary now consists of the call being blown twice, once as the dignitary's boat draws alongside the ship's accommodation ladder, and again as that person mounts the ladder and steps inboard. The procedure is reversed as the dignitary departs. Traditionally, the side is also piped when a corpse is brought on board, taken ashore, or committed to the deep. The boatswain's call dates from the era of the Greek and Roman galleys, when the stroke of the oars was called with a whistle. The call was first used in English ships about the middle of the 13th century.
